She's spent 17 years with the circus. But she's not a performer. She's a nun!

Inside the Patriot Center, the Cossacks are circling center ring when Sister Dorothy Fabritze, 67, arrives for Mass. She wasn't expecting the horse act to be there, and it is a problem. If she is to bring God to the center ring of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, the least she can do is keep it free of horse dung.

But, as Fabritze says, God provides: One of the horse trainers offers to clean the floor in time for noon Mass.

He is still sweeping when more performers begin to arrive by charter bus from their rail-car homes parked by Union Station in the District. Instead of sequin bodysuits or oversize shoes, they wear suit pants and button-down shirts. Today is their last off day in Fairfax, Va. After tomorrow's shows,

they're headed to Charleston, W.Va., the next stop on a year-long tour.

Most weeks, Mass is a stolen half an hour between shows, with a visiting priest in a spare room or hallway. But today it will be held in the center ring. Instead of death-defying feats, the main event is a flurry of baptisms, first Communions and confirmations, of which Fabritze is the unofficial ringmaster.

The Rev. Jerry Hogan, head chaplain of the circus ministry overseen by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, and the Rev. Frank Cancro have

come from Boston and North Carolina, respectively, to perform the afternoon's marathon of sacraments. But Fabritze taught the Boss Clown when to offer his son's name during a baptism. She sat for hours over many months with the trapezist's son and daughter, reciting the catechism. And she turned two folding tables into an altar and procured a green mixing bowl and a floral teacup for the baptism.

With noon approaching, Fabritze gathers the children backstage. On the other side of the red curtain, a trumpet player launches into "Ode to Joy."

"This is your moment," she says, and leads the miniature procession into the ring, to Hogan, who is wearing

vestments handmade by Ringling's costume department and adorned with clowns and lions. On the back it reads: "Greatest Show on Earth."

A few weeks after the Mass, Fabritze sits behind the wheel of her 15-yearold Coachman trailer, peering into an early morning fog, looking for red flags tacked to telephone poles. The flags were attached by the *continued on page 2*

Sr. Ancy expressed her appreciation and commended the tireless effort of the Sacred Heart community members for making this day possible and for all that they do every day for the children.

The people of Kurugodu, primarily Hindus, are very happy

with the presence and mission of the MSC sisters. For some years, the sisters and lay teachers have been providing classes in temporary structures. There are now over 500 students enrolled in the school from *continued*

Kelly Miller Circus's "24-hour man," whose job is to mark routes that can accommodate the circus's trailers. Today, the flags stretch between Bangor, Pa., and Weatherly, Pa., about 40 miles from Allentown.

Fabritze spent seven years traveling exclusively with Ringling's Blue Unit, the circus she was with in Fairfax. But these days, she and her traveling partner, Sister Mary Seibert, split their time among five circuses. It is an attempt to extend the reach of their small ministry, which falls under the church's pastoral care of migrants, refugees and travelers.

Kelly Miller is a smaller circus than Ringling Bros., although it is owned by a member of the Ringling family. (Feld Entertainment has owned the **Ringling Bros.** Circus since the 1950s.) Kelly Miller is what insiders call a "mudshow" – it

raises its tent in a different place every day, often in a muddy field. Being a circus nun is not quite what Fabritze had envisioned when she returned to the United States in the early 1990s after 15 years as a missionary in Papua New Guinea.

"When I first heard about this, I thought, 'No way, José, are you gonna do this, okay?' " she says.

But in the end, she believed that the decision was not hers to make.

"God pursued me. When you ask me, 'Why am I here?' It's because I've been pursued. I've been duped, like Jeremiah says," she says. "I could not forget it."

Since then, she has outlasted everyone in the ministry except Hogan, who has been at it 22 years.

Life in Papua New Guinea prepared her for circus life. She supervised religious instruction at 150 schools and traveled constantly. "It was canoe, motor boat, walking, climbing," she says. "Here, it's living in a trailer."

In Papua New Guinea, she also learned the value of embedding herself among the people she wanted to reach. At the circus, that has meant taking odd jobs. At Ringling, Fabritze spent two years opening and closing the main curtain between each act. "I counted it — it was 100 times per show, for 800 shows," she says.

Between rope tugs, she would have to stand in the dark as the next act waited beside her. It was in those moments that she did most of her counseling.

"They could just come over and say whatever they wanted to say for five or six minutes," she says. "If you talk it over with your mother, you can talk it over with me."

In Weatherly, Fabritze heads for the ticket booth. Christian Joseph, the circus's clown, often hangs out with her. He isn't Catholic but counts the sister as a friend. "She's always giving us prayers, which we all need," he says.

This is not an empty sentiment: Circus shows are often spiked with danger. At Kelly Miller, the trapezist doesn't use a net. Instead, her husband, the juggler, stands 30 feet below, ready to catch her if she slips.

Before the first show begins, Fabritze retreats to her trailer for midday prayers in her chapel, which takes up the master bedroom. She sleeps instead in a fold-out bed stored under the kitchen table, while Seibert takes the couch.

Fabritze regularly takes breaks from traveling, a few days at a time. Five years ago, the mother superior of her missionary order forced her and Sister Bernard Overkamp, her traveling partner at the time, to take a year-long sabbatical. Overkamp never went back; she is now a superior of their house based in Reading, Pa. Fabritze returned, but with an eye to working herself out of a job.

Sister Mary Goes to Rome

Monday of Holy Week 2015 began as usual for me during these last twenty-two years in our Mexico City mission of the Missionary Sisters of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus (MSC). I am the Religious Education Director for the children, youth and adults in the poor parish of San Ramon Nonato, and I also am the Initial Formation Director for our pre-novitiate. We are a small community with two American Sisters, two Mexican Sisters, one postulant and three candidates. Shortly after

Easter Sunday, I received an email from the Religious Formation Conference nominating me to participate in the first ever International Congress for Formators in Consecrated Life in Rome, April 7 to 11, 2015. I was elated, surprised and overjoyed to accept a scholarship made possible by a generous grant the Vatican received from an American foundation which enabled religious from every continent to attend the Congress.

Brazilian Cardinal João Braz de Aviz, the prefect of the Vatican's Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life, and the Vatican congregation's secretary Archbishop Jose Rodriquez Carballo presided over the Congress whose theme was "The Following of Christ Set Forth in the Gospel". In his opening address, Cardinal Aviz recalled Pope Francis's invitation to "look to the past with gratitude, [to see] the signs of the times through the eyes of faith and to respond creatively to the needs of the Church," while he encouraged us to "embrace the future with hope" because with God "nothing is impossible." Together, speakers, participants and volunteers of witness" to Christ and to consecrated

life. The gathering, attended by 1,320 religious women and men from 114 countries and 416 religious communities, represented the entire world, and this amazing experience deepened for me as it unfolded.

Each day of the *Congress* began and ended with prayer, often expressed through forms of liturgical dance from various continents, and the focus of the gathering remained upon forming the participants who, in turn, are responsible for the formation of women and men at the beginning of their religious lives. A wide range of presenters offered daily inspirational reflections on a variety of themes related to formation. Among these presenters were theologians from Rome, a Poor Clare Sister "present" by video and an Orthodox monk. One afternoon

was dedicated to seventeen workshops on various subjects such as: the world of young people aspiring to embrace consecrated life; the digital era; the prophetic dimension of consecrated life; the poor as agents of formation; dialogue among cultures, and enculturation in formation.

The Congress reached its highpoint with a visit to the Vatican when Cardinal Aviz presided Mass at the altar of the Chair of St. Peter and

when we were graced by a meeting with Pope Francis in the Paul VI Audience Hall. Our Holy Father seemed amazed to see us in such great numbers and immediately commented jokingly that there are probably more formators than candidates to be formed. He encouraged us saying: "I am convinced that there isn't a vocational crisis where there are consecrated persons capable of transmitting, with their own witness, the beauty of consecration. This is your ministry, your mission. You are not just 'teachers'; you are above all witnesses of the following of Christ in your own charism. Without your service, consecrated life could not exist. I ask you to pray for me and offer you my heartfelt blessing."

Concluding the International Congress, Bishop José Rodriguez Carballo passionately reminded all formators to prioritize in accordance with the Beatitudes as recounted in Matthew's Gospel and to practice patience and discernment so that the people of God might see "that luminous way of life that makes that definitive world transfigured by the beatitudes shine in a world that passes."

I knew from my arrival in Rome, when I was warmly welcomed among

the good will of all the Sisters, Priests and brothers registering us in five languages, that my experience at the *International Congress of Formators* would be larger than life! Organized by tables, my small group represented Mali, Poland, Slovakia, Germany, the United States and Mexico. Fortunately, we all spoke English and we learned from one another as we shared deeply and prayed communally. Our discussions reminded us that we are not alone in our work, that we must look at young people with the eyes of God and we must see God in their hearts. I am eternally grateful to the Religious Formation Conference for nominating me for the scholarship that made this rich experience, which forever will remain in my heart and my prayer, possible for me. \hat{v}

On June 10-12, 2015, the 2nd National Lay MSC Convocation took place at Sacred Heart Villa in Center Valley, PA.





IN MEMORIAM



Sister Helen Papan, MSC (Sister Lucille) 1943–2015

Sister Helen grew up in Reading, Pennsylvania with her parents and two younger sisters. They belonged to St. Cyril and Methodius Parish where Sister Helen attended grade school and was taught by the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Sister Helen entered the aspirancy in 1938. After her novitiate, she began her long ministry in health care by receiving

her initial training as a nurse in our own Sacred Heart Hospital School of Nursing in Allentown and later her degree in nursing at the University of Dayton. From 1949–1956 she was nursing supervisor in Good Samaritan Hospital in Pottsville and from 1956 to 1963 in Sacred Heart Hospital in Norristown. After further studies she served as assistant director of nursing service in Pottsville and Instructor in the school of practical nursing in Norristown from 1966–1968.

For two years, from 1968–1970 she was asked to be director of vocations for the province. After this she again returned to nursing as supervisor and assistant director of nursing service in our hospital in Norristown. From 1977 to 1980 she studied at the University of Pennsylvania and then taught nursing at DeSales University for seven years. For the next two years she was home caring for her aged father.

In 1989 Sister Helen began a new ministry in Sacred Heart Hospital in Norristown in patient education, and in 1995 she embarked on another special ministry in Mound Bayou, Mississippi. In this poor southern town, Sister became a special advocate for the poor and elderly as she devoted herself to their home health care and interceded on their behalf before various government and health care agencies. When we as a province withdrew from Mound Bayou, Sister Helen continued to minister in Mahanoy City, Pennsylvania as the regional parish outreach social worker. In 2005 she retired to the motherhouse.

Since her retirement in 2005, Sister Helen bore a number of physical ailments, but through them all she showed great courage and determination. When she received the news that cancer had recurred for the third time, she took the news in stride and chose to begin treatments once again; however, she continued to grow weaker and finally God called her to Himself.

Whether it was in hands-on nursing, supervision, education or social work, Sister Helen gave herself wholeheartedly. She was very competent and efficient, and had a special place in her heart for the poor and disadvantaged. Sister Helen was very friendly and outgoing and had a great sense of humor. We are grateful for the many years that she lived among us and for the many people whose lives she touched. \ddagger


That was how she left Papua New Guinea. Her ministry departed only after training local nuns to run the Catholic schools where Fabritze once taught. The difference now is that Fabritze doesn't see another nun ready to step in. "I'd love anyone on the circus who wants to be a sister, who wants to come forward, but of course, we're not finding them," she says.

As an alternative, she has sought out lay leaders who can read the Bible with those who request to hear it and train for the sacraments. But recruitment has been slow. So far, she has eight for 30 to 40 circuses. Fabritze had planned to leave when she turned 65. She has upped that to 70.

"All I'm trying to do is plant seeds," she says. "If this lay leadership and these catechists are supposed to leave a mark on the circuses at large, God will provide."

After prayers, Fabritze might squeeze in an episode of her favorite show, "Murder, She Wrote," on the small television set she keeps in a cabinet above her favorite armchair. Today, two students

come see her. Sammy, the 7-year-

today he gets to try the wine and wafers. It's good to know what to expect, Fabritze says. "They're nervous already."

Sammy stands in front of her, hands placed just so, as he will when he takes Communion.

"Today, this is just wine, and this is just bread," Fabritze tells him, and not the body and the blood of Jesus unless he takes them from a priest.

He takes a sip.

"Did you like the wine?" Perez asks.

Sammy smiles and nods.

"Oh boy," Perez says.

The ventriloquist is Fabritze's most regular visitor at Kelly Miller, five days a week for coffee at 2 p.m. He is Finnish and goes by Sebastian. Fabritze calls him an "inquirer," a person interested in the Catholic Church but not yet looking to convert.

Sebastian is nervous. He's a veteran of the European circus circuit, and this is his first tour in the United States.

He has learned that the crowd's sense of humor varies by region. His act with Hector, a long-beaked puppet, killed in the Rio Grande Valley. But last week in New Jersey, "it was very difficult."

He says he talks to Fabritze because she helps him to know God better, which means a lot coming from a man who says he took years to decide between the Lutheran priesthood and puppeteering.

The ventriloquist and the nun sip coffee as they discuss the purpose of the congregation's prayer at Mass.

"Sometimes," Fabritze says, "something really awful is happening and you don't want to say, 'Thank you, Lord.' How do you say those words?"

She says the answer came to her 50 years ago when she was training to be a nun. "When you are at Mass, it's not the individual, it's the community," she says. "When you come to liturgy, you are joining a community."

After an hour, Sebastian gets up to go. He has to do his act now. Fabritze offers her blessing, the same one she gives him each day: "Make 'em laugh." ϑ
